So many things are happening with Symphony of the Redwoods right now. It is truly a very exciting time to be a part of the orchestra's board of directors and volunteer

Firstly, we have <u>four fantastic summer concerts</u> planned for you because we cannot wait! <u>Paul McCandless and Charged Particles</u> (jazz) will start it all on July 25th at the Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens. <u>Kathleen Reynolds</u> (principal flute with SOR and Santa Rosa Symphony) will be joined by Marica Lotter, Jeff Ives, and Corrine Antipa on August 1st, also at the Gardens. The Arcata Bay String Quartet will perform outdoors at the Mendocino Presbyterian Church on August 8th and this miniseries will conclude with Scott Macomber, trumpet, Bruce Chrisp, trombone, and pianist Sharon Lee Kim playing Brass at the Gardens on August 15th.



There are no tickets to any of the concerts since there is no charge by Symphony of the Redwoods. This is a way for the Symphony to give back to the community after a long and difficult "quarantine". There is no charge at all for the Concert in the Village, and the Concerts at the Gardens are free with Gardens admission.

Most of you have learned by now that the SOR Board of Directors received Allan Pollack's resignation letter a few months ago. It is the end of an era and he will always be remembered for the incredible and multiple ways he brought live music to the coast and inspired so many of us. His gift to this community is unmeasurable. Please read the article in this newsletter with musicians' notes of thanks and appreciation.

A Search Committee has been formed, consisting of mostly active SOR musicians that will be in charge of the process of finding a new Artistic Director/Conductor.
